Section	Executive Summary of this Annual Report
<b>B-Executive Summary</b>	<p>Libraries have a persistent image of being just a warehouse of books. Since the 2008-2009 academic year the library has concentrated on extending its resources and services to students and faculty (through its robust digital collections, mobile services, e-Learning forums, electronic communication, etc.) and promoting the library building as a venue for a variety of academic activities. In the last 18 months, the library has been more involved in the academic life of the university than ever before. The achievements documented in this report demonstrate the library's commitment to its goal to create "an inviting environment that empowers independent exploration, inspires a community of scholars, and promotes life-long learning." The IPFW Learning Commons in collaboration with Student Affairs, ITS, Physical Plant and others is becoming a reality. The second floor of the library has been almost entirely emptied of books and stacks (a feat requiring the planning and execution of a small military campaign) and the Writing Center, information services librarians, Learning Commons consultants, the Executive Director for Major Scholarships and the Chapman Scholars program, some new furniture, two study rooms and a new information desk (on-order) have been installed. During this report period, the library second floor has been opened to host academic meetings and events including the Featured Faculty lecture series, University Religious Forum, Undergraduate History Conference, Lunch with a Historian, CASA Diversity Workshop, and the CNET Senior Capstone design charrette. In addition, other areas of the library have been used to host the first Faculty Author Series, Career Services assistance, Supplemental Instruction (SI), the Northeast Indiana Diversity Library, the IPFW university archives, IPFW Center for Social Research, Student Art-in-the-Library exhibits, and FAME exhibit. For the first time in its history, with the help of Student Affairs, the library was able to stay open 24 hours during the last two weeks of the Spring 2011 semester, and plans are to provide the same service in Fall 2011 and Spring 2012.</p> <p>The library's second goal, "to provide effective user-centered information services when and where they are needed," is a guiding principle. In addition to providing in-person research consulting services, students and faculty can now Ask a Librarian anytime through e-mail, IM chat, and e-Learning forums. Mobile web access is available for online course guides, library hours and computer and study room availability. Again, in collaboration with Student Affairs the library provided laptops for checkout to students beginning with the spring 2011 semester.</p> <p>Library services and resources for students and faculty have expanded and spread out well beyond library walls. The library has increased its online holdings in all formats, such as digital images (ArtStor), video (American History in Video, Ethnographic Video Online), sound (American Song, Jazz Music online), primary sources (19<sup>th</sup> Century U.S. Newspapers, eHRAF Archaeology and World Cultures), and over 200,000 e-books and 50,000 e-journals.</p> <p>The library's third goal is to "develop and promote exceptional librarian-faculty partnerships that improve scholarly and creative accomplishments of students and faculty." Liaison librarians met with thousands of students through one-to-one information consulting sessions, in-class information literacy instruction, online course guides and tutorials. In partnership with teaching faculty, librarians are co-teaching the graduate nursing informatics course, W131 and W232 online courses, and contributing to an online textbook in Visual Communication. In the absence of one required course for all first 30-hour students, the library has concentrated on reaching out to both student affairs and academic affairs to add an information literacy component to as many fye-type activities as possible. The goal is to increase the number of opportunities to meet with first 30-hour students and provide information about library resources and services. Efforts to reach the first 30-hour student have included taking part in SOAR, Chapman Scholars information fair, Library Welcome Tent, Freshman Fest, and providing library orientation for international, Upward Bound Bridge, Summer Bridge, and residence hall students, Honors Freshman Seminar, and the MedPOWER program.</p>

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	<p>The library has expanded its citation searching and journal ranking capabilities for faculty and offered two workshops in conjunction with the campus Promotion and Tenure workshops during the spring 2011 semester. In collaboration with the VCAA and ORES (now RESP), faculty scholarly and creative achievements are available worldwide through the <i>Opus: Research and Creativity at IPFW</i> website. <i>Opus</i> also celebrates the scholarly achievements of students with the addition of the 2010 and 2011 Student Research and Creative Endeavor Symposium, the Department of History Undergraduate conference, and the ETCS senior design projects. There are now almost 6,000 items in <i>Opus</i> and over 25,000 downloads. Through partnerships with Student Government, Mike Downs Center for Indiana Politics, IPFW Archaeological Survey, University Relations, College of Arts and Sciences, the library has added over 10,000 images to mDON in 2010.</p> <p>Librarians reflect favorably on the university through their scholarship and service to the community and profession with nine publications, six state and national presentations, and numerous active service commitments that involve leadership roles at the state and national level (see <i>Opus</i> for details).</p> <p>The library's current strategic plan runs through 2011 and a process is underway to develop a new strategic plan for the next 3-5 years. The resources necessary to accomplish the university and library goals are detailed at the end of this report. Key among the requests are: 1) hiring a full-time staff Learning Commons Assistant. Current funding for Learning Commons staffing is limited to part-time student consultants. There is no funding to provide a staff person responsible to the university for overseeing and managing the Learning Commons on a daily basis; some of the 90-hours/week service hours can be covered by current library staff, but there are not enough staff hours to cover two service points (1<sup>st</sup> &amp; 2<sup>nd</sup> floor) for 90-hours/week; 2) Wireless upgrade for the library. Now that student housing and the LA building have been completed, the library should be the campus' next priority; 3) library server upgrades. The library relies on its computer network to provide outstanding services to faculty, students and staff but current servers are old, can no longer be upgraded, and must be replaced; 4) Renovation of the library first floor. While the whole library needs renovation (campus estimate is \$13.5 million), the first floor is in most need of remodeling, primarily to make better use of space in response to Learning Commons needs and updated, more efficient use of library staff and resources.</p>
